Annex 2: Consultation and engagement

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1. Introduction

This annex provides a summary of the consultation undertaken and engagement opportunities provided through the river basin planning process in the lead up to the publication of the Scotland river basin management plan (RMBP).

This annex explains how stakeholders have contributed to the development of the river basin management plan. It describes:

- consultation opportunities;
- active involvement in the river basin planning process;
- public access to information.

The European Union's Water Framework Directive (WFD) was transposed into Scottish legislation via the Water Environment and Water Services (Scotland) Act 2003 (WEWS). Part 1 Section 17 of the WEWS act contains a requirement to set up river basin district advisory groups (national and area advisory groups) as a structure for delivering active involvement in the river basin planning process. The process for establishing these groups and the river basin planning process was developed through consultation as set out in the <u>River basin planning strategy for the Scotland</u> <u>RBD</u>. A network of a national advisory group and eight area advisory groups with forums was established in 2006. Information on the activities of these groups is in Table 2 below.

The WEWS act also contains requirements to:

- Publish a statement setting out the steps (including consultation measures) which will be taken in connection with the preparation of the plan. A Plan of Action River Basin Planning in the Scotland River Basin District report was therefore produced in 2007 for consultation as summarised in Section 2 below.
- Produce a summary of significant water management issues for the district. This was published for consultation in the 2008 significant water management issues report and the responses have been used to inform the draft river basin management plan. A summary of the consultation responses has been included in Section 5 below.
- Publish and consult on a draft river basin management plan. The draft plan was published and consulted on for a period of 6 months closing in June 2009. 		The key areas where changes were made included:		
		Delivering improvements		
		The most significant change between the draft and first plan is the greater ambition. The first plan sets out our target of achieving good status in the vast majority of water bodies by 2027. Where good status is not possible by 2015 (and in a small number of cases by 2027) we have included the reasons why we have extended deadlines or set less stringent objectives.		
		Stakeholders highlighted the importance of integrated catchment management planning and the need for us to work more effectively at a catchment scale to develop integrated solutions to protect and improve the water environment. We have set objectives for priority catchments over the first three planning cycles. We are running a pilot project in the Clyde area and will continue to work with area advisory groups at a catchment scale.		
		Stakeholders also commented on incorporating considerations about climate change into the river basin management planning process and we have embedded climate change considerations through the plan.		
		The Scottish Government is developing regulations to assist with restoration of pressures affecting the beds, banks and shores of our water environment from historic activities.

		Partnership working		
		We were pleased that so many organisations were supportive of continuing to develop new ways of working together and that they volunteered information on current and proposed projects. The success of the river basin management plan is reliant on SEPA and other organisations delivering actions to improve the water environment. We will continue to work with established groups in the area. Additionally stakeholders are keen to get involved and develop new projects to see on the ground improvements.		
		Information on the assessment of pressures and impacts		
		We have been working to incorporate new monitoring data and assessment tools (eg for acidification and an interim fish tool) into the classification system for the first plan. We have also collected more data on the location of fish barriers from fisheries trusts and boards, and have worked with stakeholders to review and set new assessments for ecological potential for artificial/heavily modified water bodies. Where possible we have considered consultation responses to individual water bodies. There are some comments on specific water bodies that we have not been able to review in time for the publication of the first plan; these will be taken into account as we plan our monitoring and undertake classification assessments through 2010. Classification assessments will be updated annually.

		Changes to the layout and presentation of information in the plan		
		We received comments about the style, shape and overall content of the plans, the information provided throughout the documents and about the interactive map. We have worked to develop a first plan that is simpler and more accessible. We also recognise that other formats of information will be required for specific or more general audiences. For example, we will produce a very simplified summary for the general public and we are working on a communications strategy for the agricultural sector with our partners in the Diffuse Pollution Management Advisory Group.

	The river basin management planning advisory group network for the Scotland RBD was established in mid 2006. It consists of a national advisory group and eight area advisory groups drawing together responsible authorities, non governmental organisations, industry, business and other stakeholders with an interest in the water environment at a national and local level. In addition each area advisory group has a forum with wide and open membership.

	Advisory group members were identified initially using responsible authority designations and the Article five characterisation assessments for the Scotland RBD, along with key stakeholders. A first meeting of each advisory group was then held and representatives were invited to identify additional members required. The advisory group membership is flexible and can be adjusted to accommodate changes in river basin planning requirements.

	The overall role of the national advisory group is to oversee the river basin management planning process, to contribute to the preparation of the river basin management plan for the Scotland RBD and to co-ordinate the work of the area advisory groups. 	A three day workshop was held in March 2008 and was attended by SEPA, Scottish and Southern Energy, Scottish Water, British Waterways, Alcan and Scottish Power to discuss HWMBs and AWBs related to their operations. The workshop applied UKTAG methodology which defines the measures which would be required to achieve good ecological potential. Assessments were made as to which HMWBs/AWBs were currently at good ecological potential and objectives were set for when those not currently at that status would reach it. This event was attended by 15 operators.	
	A further stakeholder workshop, attended by 21 operators and stakeholders, was held in Aviemore in April 2009 to provide area advisory group members (and any fisheries trusts and boards not represented on AAGs) with an opportunity to comment on the outputs from the operators' workshop and to provide SEPA with additional information on the ecological potential assessments.
